Chair Keenan, Chair Ryan, and members of the Joint Committee on Election Laws, I'm Arlene Olivero, the mother of two children ages 11 and 13, and I'm pleased to offer testimony in support of all the bills before you this session that would expand the age eligibility of voting.

I want to again bring to your attention the fact that, to date, a large segment of the population below the age of 18 have been devalued and disenfranchised by not being allowed to vote in local or national elections.

I believe that teens and younger children have the capacity to understand the implications of laws. They are subject directly to the impact of these laws and thus should have a voice and direct impact via voting in the formation of these laws.

Lowering the voting age will help our whole community to consider and value issues that impact children and young families more. It will engage, empower, and teach new skills to our children regarding how to think about community needs, consider the choices and limitations of government, act with responsibility and care for all citizens, and learn that their voice and needs matter in a democracy.

I believe that the constitution in its rendering of "We the people..." meant everyone not just a subset of the population in terms of being given the

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rights, freedoms, responsibilities, and roles in our nation.

I sincerely hope these bills will move forward, and I thank you for your consideration. I think our communities and nation will be better in the future if we can lower the voting age and engage more young citizens in the political system directly via their voting.

I urge the Joint Committee on Election Laws to report all the bills before you this session that would expand the age eligibility of voting favorably and in a timely manner.
